



## **'Rhymes With Orange'** Anh Nguyen

Anh Nguyen will paint anything that she can visually engage with. She recalls a quote from another painter, whose name she has long forgotten but whose words have stayed with her:

'Still life is the thing that is close by, figures and portraits a little farther away, and landscape is in the distance or if you get up and walk a bit, she says. 'It is all part of the observed world and ready for a curious magpie to eyeball.'

While Anh will joke that still life is more forgiving than portraiture and more comfortable than plein-air landscape painting, what actually draws her to the genre is that it allows a number of different approaches. It also feels very straightforward, a neutral canvas without pressure to introduce symbolism or narrative, she says.

It is rare that Anh will have an idea for a still life first, then construct it purely according to the idea. A mother of four small children, she thinks that the phase of life she's in is significant to what she chooses to paint, and she sees painting as a way to both prolong and explore her personal visual experiences: to record the things that interest her and to express that experience. 'It probably already existed in position before I happened upon it. Having said that, I will then do what needs to be done to make it a better picture, whether it be shifting objects, moving my own positioning, or sometimes reconstructing a similar image at a different time.'

The period between when Anh sees something she intends to paint and beginning the process ranges from immediately to days or months, and maybe even years. Photography plays an important part because she has always been an avid photographer - not simply as a reference but because her photos will often initiate that first impulse. 'How I paint within the confines of the 2D plane is also highly influenced by photography, that act of looking through a viewfinder, she says. 'It also shows me intersections, tangents, values in black and white, distorted perspective, collaging - things that my eye cannot readily fathom. I am not so interested in painting exactly what I see, whether in life or from a photograph."

Describing her works as something between abstraction and observation, Anh is highly preoccupied with colour, 'especially in the context of surrounding colour, the mood I am trying to convey and that magical effect of light that causes the same colour to look different.'

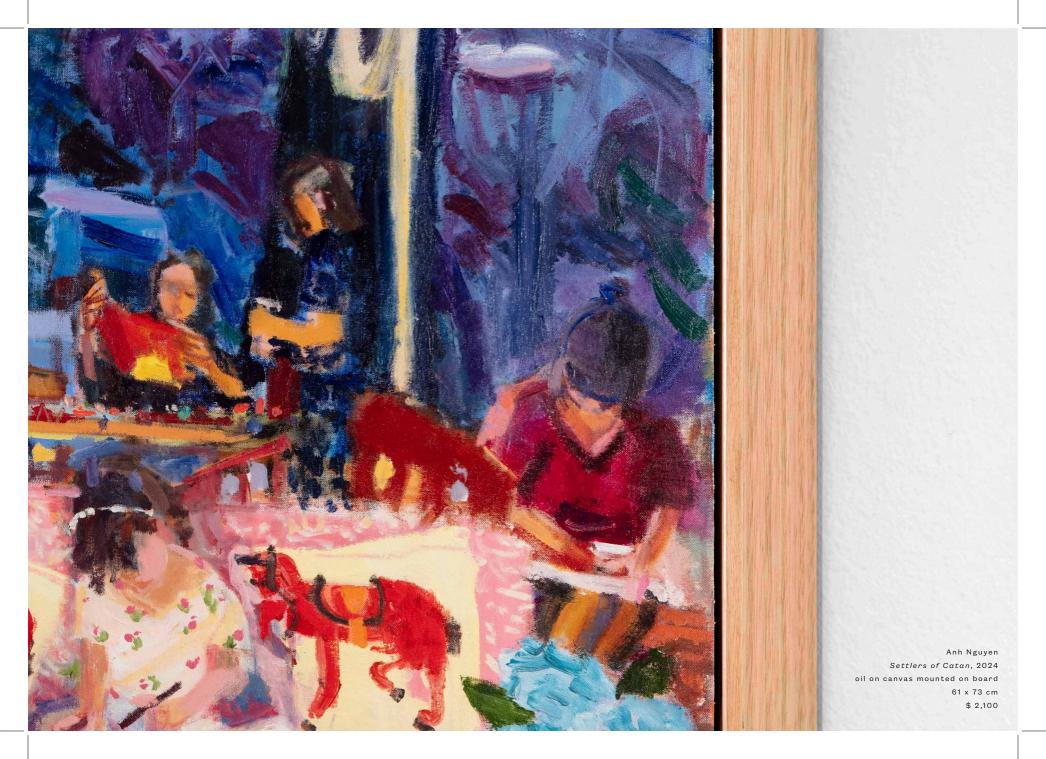
Colour is most often where memory plays a stronger role for Anh, and if she is not painting from life, or she needs to return in a later session, she will take notes in the form of small poems which describe the scene. "They don't always help. It sometimes gets so descriptive or alarmingly obscure that I really just have to paint it to see, she says.

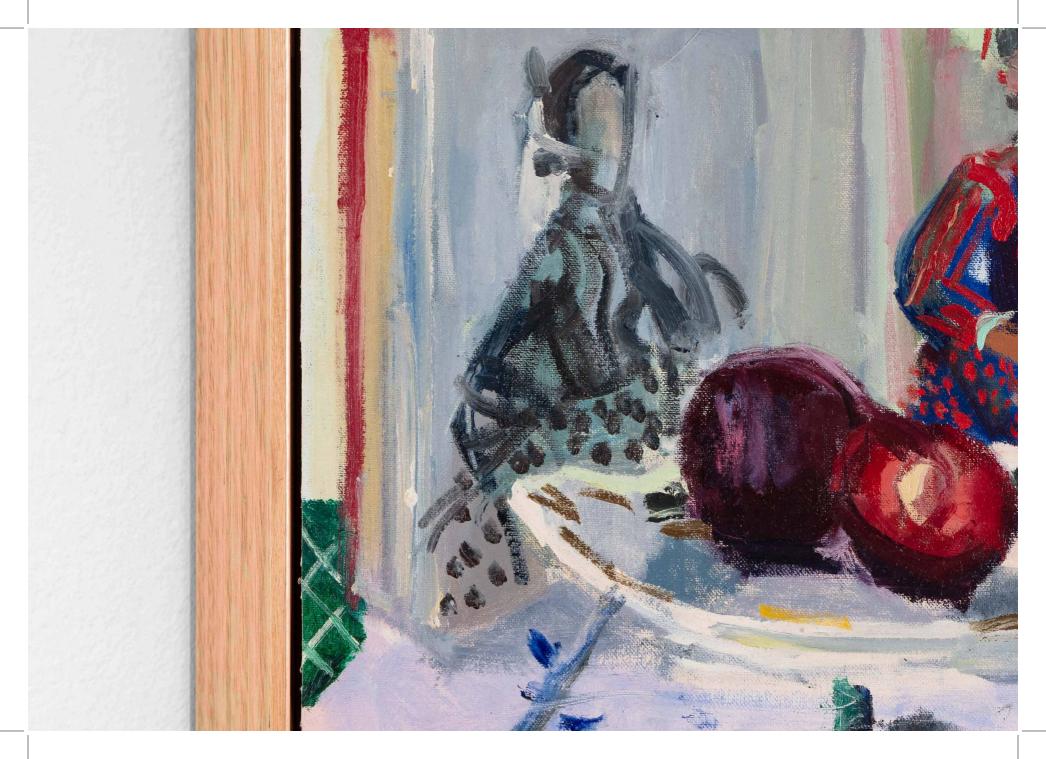

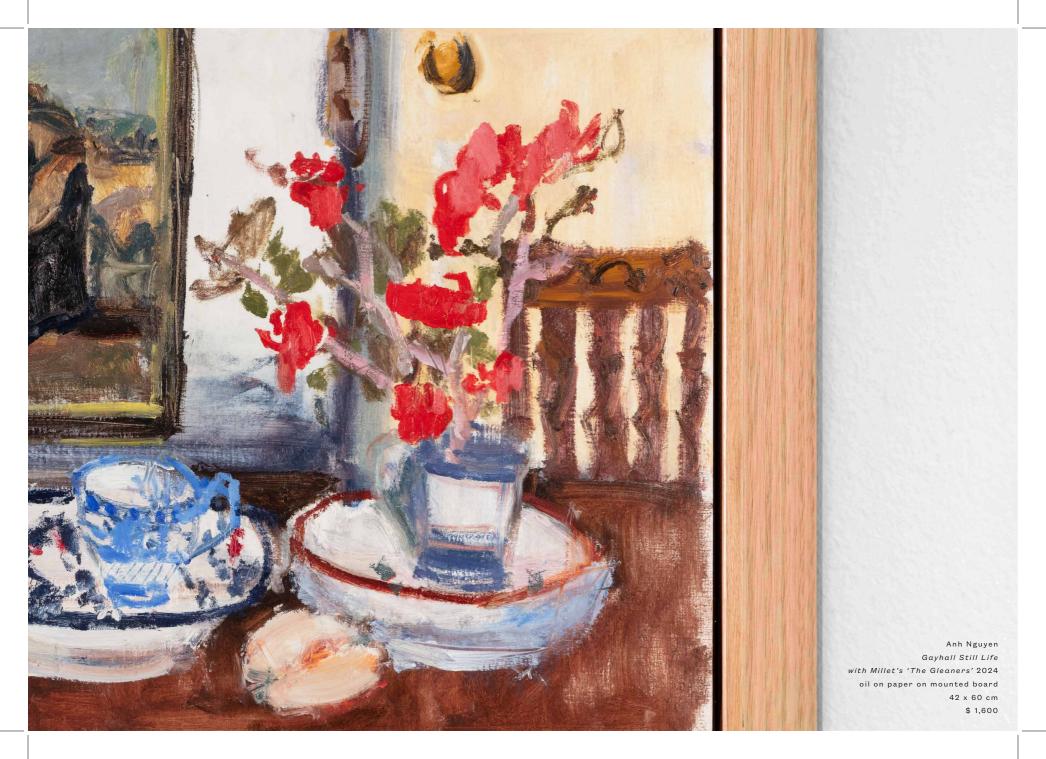

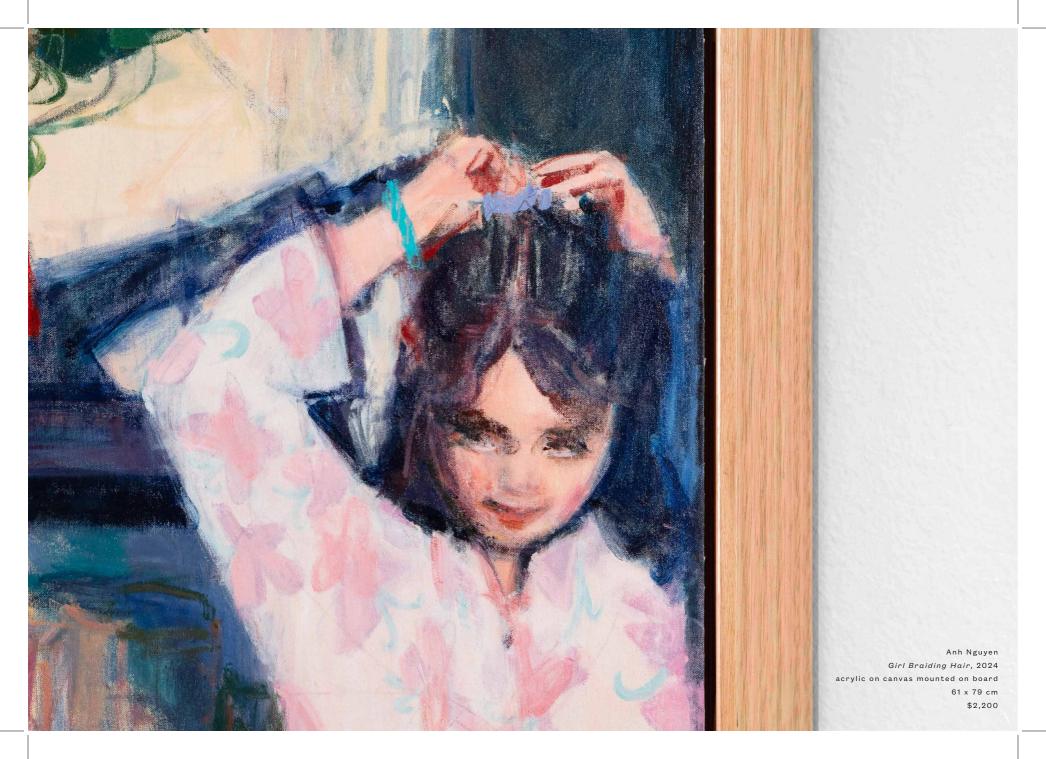


Anh Nguyen Red in the Blue, 2024 oil on canvas mounted on board 60 x 80 cm \$2,200

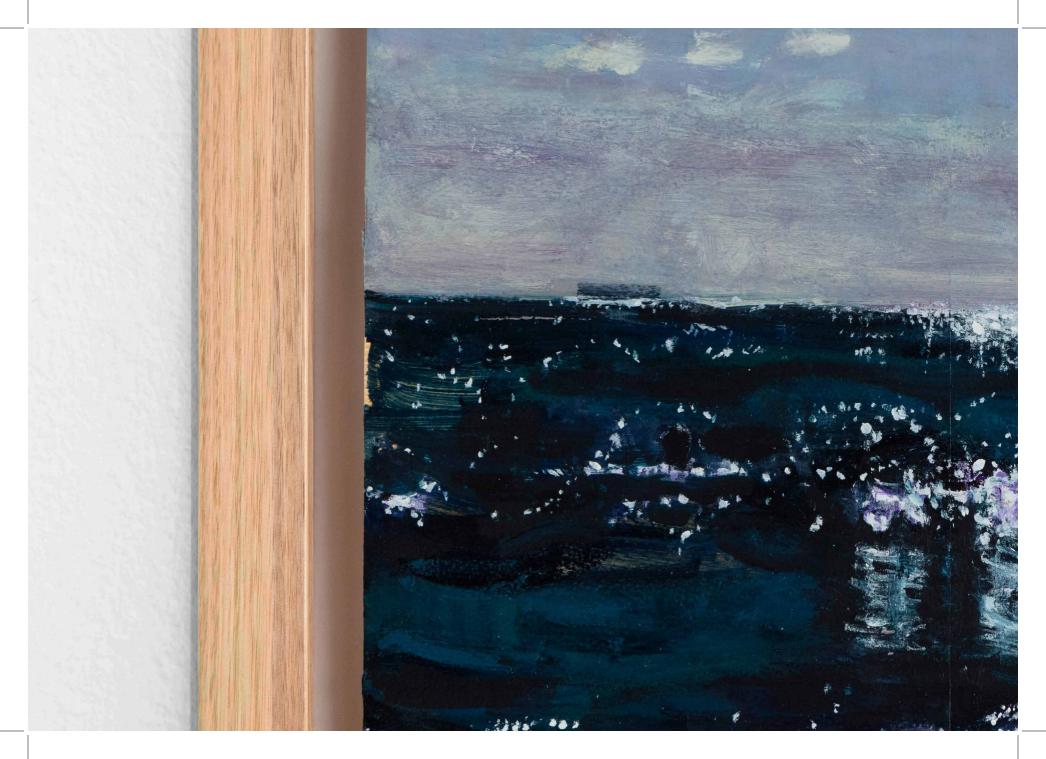
